As One Who Had Authority (Mark 1:21-28, Pt. 1)

Have you ever heard someone speak or teach in such a unique way that it caught your attention? In a much grander way, Jesus had this impact on listeners. What made His teaching so distinct? Look at Mark 1:21-22, " 21 And they went into Capernaum, and immediately on the Sabbath he entered the synagogue and was teaching. 22 And they were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as the scribes."

Even though Jesus was a carpenter (Mark 6:3), He is teaching in a synagogue (like a Jewish church). It was customary for respected Jewish males to teach in these settings. His teaching caused people to be "astonished" and the reason is because He taught as one who had "authority." What does this mean? Perhaps it means that Jesus was

confident when He spoke. However, one can easily imagine others teaching confidently, so there must be more going on.

The Old Testament prophets often preached, saying, "thus says the LORD!" Jesus' preaching does not make statements like this. Rather, He speaks as if He is the authority (cf. Matthew 5:21-48). He will say "truly, truly, I say to you..." around 26 times in John's Gospel.

Imagine growing up hearing lessons in the Synagogue all your life. Whenever you have heard others teach, they have referred to the authority of Scriptures and "thus says the LORD" and to the respected wisdom handed down through the Jewish traditions. Nobody you have ever heard has presumed upon himself to be the authority... until you first hear Jesus the

carpenter on a Saturday.

What were the people thinking in the synagogue that day? At first, I think I would be skeptical and want to know more. It is in this same context where Jesus' words will cast a demon out of a man (vs. 23-28). We will say more about that in the next articles. For now, consider the authority to which you submit. Consider the reaction people had to Jesus' preaching - it was astonishing because He taught as One who had authority.

The main reactions to Jesus in the Gospels were either hatred or worship. If we are indifferent, it is partly because we haven't paid attention to how He taught. Are you paying attention? He has authority over your life. You will either love it or hate it when you see it.

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What Is Your Anchor?

We live in a world where many people are "adrift". They have nothing they have "anchored" themselves to in defining who and what they are. This is true for people of all ages. In Psalms 62, David writes about God being his "rock and salvation" and that David will not be greatly moved. David also states in verse 7, "In God is my salvation and my glory; The rock of my strength, And my refuge, is in God."

As a Christian, is your rock, salvation, strength and refuge in God? God alone can give us the anchoring needed in this life to prepare us for eternity. Today, so many people are "adrift" and being "moved" through social media, "world thinking and doing" and the influence of others instead of God. David continues in verse 8, "Trust in Him at all times, you people; Pour out your heart

before Him; God is a refuge for us." Too many times people are "pouring out their heart" on social media instead of trusting in and following God. God expects us to count on Him and His mercy. David closes in verse 12 with, "Also to You, O Lord, belongs mercy; For you render to each one according to his work." What is your work? Who/what is your God? What is your anchor? God knows, do you?
